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Sabbath—the Very Beginning

"Why aren't the preachers today telling their people the truth?" I heard blasting from my radio. I was on the way home after finishing my shift as a maintenance electrician at a well-known oil tool products plant when I was forever changed by those words.

In my less-than-completely-sober state, I remember shouting back at my radio, "Yeah, buddy! Let them have it!" And, just what was the topic over which the radio personality was lambasting preachers? It was the commandment to keep the Sabbath holy as stated in Exodus 20.

To be honest, the beginning of the change in my life happened when I was in the 7th grade at Good Shepherd School in my hometown, a long-time Catholic educational facility. It was some time during that year that the nun who taught the class explained to us how to look up scriptures in the Bible. Of course, it was the Imprimatur version authorized by the Church in Rome, but it contained a reliable version of Exodus 20.

"I want to show you how to find the commandments in the Bible" she had told the class. All of us were told to find the book of Exodus and then to find the 20th chapter.

As we read aloud in class, working our way through the scriptures, we came across the commandment that did not read the same as the Catholic catechism, which states that the 4th commandment was to keep the Lord's Day holy.

I spoke up in class, asking the obvious question, "Why does the bible say Sabbath Day instead of Lord's Day like the catechism does?" The nun responded honestly stating, "The Sabbath Day is Saturday but our Holy Father has changed it to Sunday. We are still supposed to not work, except on Sunday now."

I remember thinking to myself, "Who is a man that can change the law of God?" Even then I understood that it did not make sense that God would make a command, call failure to keep it "sin," and then just let some man change it.

It was then that I recognized the hypocrisy of the Catholic Church, which I transferred to all other churches which kept that same day. It was almost immediately a consequence of that question that I was removed from being an altar boy at any service time, an honor that had become a symbol of the hypocrisy I was quickly coming to be disgusted over.

I managed to finish the 8 years at that school, but when given the opportunity to exit that system I jumped onto it.

My disdain for all churches continued until that fateful night in the spring of 1982 when I heard that voice from the radio lambasting today's preachers. His topic, God's Sabbath Day, grabbed my attention and when I arrived at our home, I sat in my car listening to his message. My wife, wondering why I had not come into the house, went out to find me sitting and listening. She joined me and it was then that we both began the changes in our lives leading us to today.

The initial change in our lives was the opening of our minds to understand that God was still present, and that He had His Church continuing to keep His Sabbath Days as He had commanded so long ago. I had long ago forgotten that day in the classroom when I first read about keeping the Sabbath holy, but now the memory came rushing back, reminding me that I'd seen the lie so long ago. It was with praise for God that I considered that I had been right so long ago, and yet with sadness that I further realized that I had also abandoned the rest of the admonitions of Exodus 20 in my disgust over the hypocrisy.

As I said, that was the beginning of the changes in our, my wife and myself, lives. As I learned more about the Way of God, it became clear that there was a lot more to obeying God than the letter of the law found in Exodus 20.

One of the scriptures that stuck with me early on was in Matthew 6:33, "But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness; and all these things shall be added to you." I had been laid off from that same job due to the oil crash of the early 80s. I needed a job and worried about how we would make ends meet, but that scripture told me where my priority should lie. We always were able to pay the bills and provide enough food for the family—and we were able to dive deeply into a course of study that led us to a greater understanding of God's law.

Still, we had some understanding, but were continuing to do the things that we had been doing, except that we began trying to keep the commandments as best we could. One funny thing that we did, in our poor understanding of the command against idols, was to gather up bowling trophies, animal-image curios and even pictures in our Catholic bible (given to us by a well-meaning priest at our marriage) and then to destroy them. We laugh at that now, but it led to our greater understanding of this scripture, found in Acts 5:32, "And we are His witnesses of these things. And so also is the Holy Spirit, whom God has given to those who obey Him."

We were obeying in a naïve way, but we were trying to obey—and God honored that, as He has done in so many other ways over the years, patiently waiting for us to come to a greater understanding and then to do that which is pleasing in His sight.

Eventually, I found a job. We were blessed in that my wife had a job that only required her presence during the normal work week. But, when I found a job, the Sabbath immediately became an issue. This new job was at a 7 day a week establishment. When I interviewed for the position, I was led to be honest about the fact that I would not be available from Friday sunset until Saturday sunset, but that I was willing to work any other hours that they wanted me to work. I was given a job and a location to which I was to report. I was doing the best possible

job I could do when, after a few weeks, the management of that location decreed that I should work Friday night. After explaining that I'd explained during my interview that I could not work on God's Sabbath, and when those hours were, it was reiterated to me that I was to work Friday night. God gave me the strength to say, "Then I guess I'm out of a job because I'm not going to work on the Sabbath."

But, almost immediately the manager said "I guess you are serious about it then." The schedule was changed and as long as I worked there the schedule no longer listed me for the hours of the Sabbath.

God has led us to greater and greater understanding as we have continued in His Church. One great trial in which He was faithful to keep us safe from deception was the collapse of the Worldwide Church of God (WCG) due to the decision by the heretic Tkach father and son duo to adopt the idea that we are not actually required to keep God's Sabbaths anymore. Knowing what you now know about my disgust for hypocrisy in churches, you can imagine our reaction to the Tkach announcements. God continued to lead us, this time out of the WCG and into the United Church of God (UCG). However, the seeds of mistrust were sown, and when it became clear that UCG intended to continue in some of the erroneous dogma of WCG, we bid that organization adieu, also.

Now, we pastor a small local congregation that remains faithful to the faith once delivered, and which studies to find that which is good, holding it fast. Are we perfect even now in our understanding? I think not, but I'm content to study, meditate, pray and fast while God continues to open our understanding to ways to rightly divide the word of truth.

One thing we will not be is deceived by "ministers" who serve their own bellies first, or who deny the scriptures with their pretzel logic surrounding the sacrifice of Christ having done away with any of God's Laws.

And, to think that this all started with God's showing me His Sabbath so very long ago. Praise Him!

Sabbath Keeping in the 300s-400s AD

Among the predominant myths about the Sabbath is that its practice ceased in early Church history. Interestingly enough, no primary sources from the time period hint at this. There is actually very little discussion about the Sabbath in the first two centuries after the first Apostles.

As we arrive in the fourth and fifth centuries AD, the Sabbath becomes a more common subject discussed in primary source documents. During these centuries, the Roman Church argued against Sabbath observance while most of the Christian world still honored it. The Roman Church advocated fasting on Sabbath as a way to denigrate it.

In the May-June 2019 edition of <u>The Sabbath Sentinel</u>, I discussed that a significant number of Christians during these centuries tried to keep the Sabbath in addition to Sunday. This was unfortunate; in that article I also explained the events that lead to this development. Despite it, the Sabbath was still highly esteemed among most of Christendom. Below, I have listed quotes from these two centuries which clarify that the majority of Christians still honored the seventh-day Sabbath.

363/364 AD - Council of Laodicea

Canon 16: On Sabbath [Saturday], the Gospels and other portions of the Scripture shall be read aloud. Canon 29: Christians shall not Judaize and be idle on Saturday, but shall work on that day; but the Lord's day they shall especially honour, and, as being Christians, shall if possible, do no work on that day. If, however, they are found Judaizing, they shall be shut out from Christ. (Quoted from: Hefele, pp 302-319)

This Roman Church Council was held at a time

when a Christian group called Arians was a strong political and religious entity in the Eastern Roman Empire. Arians had Sabbath keeping tendencies. In this Council, seventh-day observance was condemned, but the Sabbath still retained some significance as the Scriptures were encouraged to be read on it. Despite its canons, the council did not change the strong Sabbath keeping tendencies of the times. Most continued its practice.

360s AD - Pseudo-Athanasius

"They met on the Sabbath, not that they were infected with Judaism, but to worship Jesus, the Lord of the Sabbath..." (Homilia de Semente, quoted by Bingham, 1138). This work was composed either by Athanasius or someone close to the same time period.

360s AD - Epiphanius

He wrote that the Apostles set services for the fourth day of the week, the evening of Sabbath and the Lord's Day (De fide, sec. 22, 24). It should be noted that no assemblies for teaching or exhortation were commanded by the Apostles for the fourth day and first day of the week. Epiphanius cites no Scriptures to support this view.

Late 300s AD

The <u>Apostolic Constitutions</u> was a series of books written to describe the practices of some Christians. The seventh and eighth books were composed in the later part of the fourth century. We have some quotes from it below. The Sabbath was honored as a day of rest and sacred convocation. Fasting on the day was forbidden.

"O Lord Almighty You have created the world by Christ, and hast appointed the Sabbath in memory thereof, be-

cause that on that day You have made us rest from our works, for the meditation upon Your laws...On this account He permitted men every Sabbath to rest, that so no one might be willing to send one word out of his mouth in anger on the day of the Sabbath. For the Sabbath is the ceasing of the creation, the completion of the world, the inquiry after laws, and the grateful praise to God for the blessings He has bestowed upon men" (Book 7, sec. 36).

380-390s AD – John Chrysostom

"There are many among us now, who fast on the same day as the Jews, and keep the Sabbaths in the same manner..." (Commentary on Galatians, 1:7).

405 AD - Letter from Augustine to Jerome

"For if we say that it is wrong to fast on the seventh day, we shall condemn not only the Church of Rome, but also many other churches, both neighbouring and more remote, in which the same custom continues to be observed. If, on the other hand, we pronounce it wrong not to fast on the seventh day, how great is our presumption in censuring so many churches in the East, and by far the greater part of the Christian world!" (Letter 82, sec. 14).

The greater part of the Christian world still considered the Sabbath a day of rest and enjoyment, whereas some of the Western Churches considered it a fast day.

Sozomen (late 300s-420s AD)

"Likewise some meet both upon the Sabbath and upon the day after the Sabbath, as at Constantinople, and among almost all others. At Rome and Alexandria they do not. Among the Egyptians, likewise, in many cities and villages, there is also a sacred custom among all of meeting on the evening of the Sabbath, when the sacred mysteries are partaken of" (Church History, bk 7, ch 19).

Socrates Scholasticus (late 300s-430s AD)

"The Arians, as we have said, held their meetings without the city. As often therefore as the festal days oc-

curred — I mean Saturday and Lord's day—in each week, on which assemblies are usually held in the churches, they congregated within the city gates about the public squares..." (Church History, bk 6, ch 8).

"For although almost all churches throughout the world celebrate the sacred mysteries on the Sabbath of every week, yet the Christians of Alexandria and at Rome, on account of some ancient tradition, have ceased to do this..." (ibid, bk 5, ch 22).

Socrates recorded important details. First, nearly all churches honored the Sabbath. Secondly, Rome and Alexandria were the first two cities that ceased to gather every Sabbath. He recorded that Rome and Alexandria ceased to honor the Sabbath; this means at one time they honored it. They stopped honoring it because of a tradition, not Scripture. Jesus warned us about the traditions of man that contradict the commandments of God (Matt. 15:1-20).

John Cassian (420-429 AD)

"And throughout the whole of the East it has been settled, ever since the time of the preaching of the Apostles, when the Christian faith and religion was founded, that these Vigils should be celebrated as the Sabbath dawns... And so, after the exertion of the Vigil, a dispensation from fasting, appointed in like manner for the Sabbath by apostolic men, is not without reason enjoined in all the churches of the East...." (Institutes, 3:9).

Though Sunday observance gradually crept in, the Sabbath still retained great influence. These primary sources indicate the obvious truth that Sabbath keeping remained the majority practice among Christians in the fourth and fifth centuries. In the Eastern Churches, some degree of Sabbath keeping would remain the majority practice for hundreds of years into the future. In Western Europe, Sabbath keeping gradually became a minority practice among Christians.



The Blessed Day

The week has passed. My work is done. Sun has set; Sabbath is here. I'm so ready.

Another busy workweek wore me out, as usual. I've leaned toward this moment all day. Walking through the front door, I sigh audibly, bodily. The best day of the week arrives in the nick of time, greeting me like an old friend. I smile.

I can't explain it, but in that instant, space shifts, time tips, and I let go. It's Sabbath.

So here I am writing these thoughts with my family sleeping, the lights low, and my feet kicked up.

I love the Sabbath. I have for as long as I can remember. I can't imagine living without it or why anyone would want to try. A well-meaning Christian once told me I didn't have to keep Sabbath because I wasn't under the law. My defense wasn't theologically well formed, although I think it could've been. All that came out then was "Can I keep it if I want?"

Now it's a running joke in my family. Dragging myself home on Friday evening, I'll often quip with a wink to my wife, while I'm flopping onto the couch, "Thank God I'm under the law."

I just turned 48, and my workweek takes a bigger toll as the years pile up. Yes, I was one of the weird church kids who actually liked Sabbath p.m. naps. I enjoy them now even more, along with what "church" can really be and how Sabbath makes that possible.

If real life has taught me anything, it's that I need Sabbath and that Sabbath is there for me.

For all of us. It's not just about the law, important as that is; it's about delight. Sabbath is the best day of the week simply because it's the blessed day of the week. A delight. Why would anyone want to miss out on that?

Lord of Sabbath

The more I experience Sabbath as a blessing, the more I realize how much it's entangled in Jesus. I learned long ago that I can't fully know God's Sabbath by starting at creation and moving toward Christ through the law. Jesus is the first, the last, and the center. Beginning with Him, I discover that which-ever way I go, He's waiting for me there, illuminating the text in wonderful ways.

Mark 2:23-28 illustrates this profoundly. It tells how Jesus' hungry disciples picked grain to eat while walking through a field on the Sabbath and were accused by the Pharisees of breaking the command. Jesus, more concerned about human need than defining work, replies, "The Sabbath was made for man, and not man for the Sabbath. Therefore the Son of Man is also Lord of the Sabbath" (vv. 27, 28).

I love the simplicity in which Jesus corrects the misguided Pharisees who, in professing the day, had missed its blessing: Don't take what God made for us and turn it against us. Jesus can say this because He is "Lord of the Sabbath." That's it in a nutshell.

As simple as Jesus' reply is in this situation, it blows my mind how far-reaching it is. Jesus addresses the origin ("made"), the intent ("for"), and the scope ("man"/humanity) of the Sabbath.

As in a later argument over marriage and di-

vorce (10:2-12), you can almost hear Jesus saying, "But from the beginning of the creation, God 'made'" (v. 6). Christ can take us back to creation and claim lordship over it because as the Word of God, He was there (John 1:1-3). He made it all and knows its purpose as only the Creator can. Let's head back to the beginning now and find the Lord of the Sabbath there.

Then God blessed

"Thus the heavens and the earth, and all the host of them, were finished. And on the seventh day God ended His work which He had done, and He rested on the seventh day from all His work which He had done. Then God blessed the seventh day and sanctified it, because in it He rested from all His work which God had created and made" (Genesis 2:1-3).

If this were all the Bible ever said about Sabbath, I'd be asking, "How do I get in on this blessed day?"

The first thing declared "holy" in Scripture isn't a thing at all but the day in which God ceased from His creative work, having declared it all "very good." The "holy" points us away from things made and the labors by which they are made, to what transcends and enriches it all: God. By His example we sense the call to let go and trust Him.

Further, the blessing of the seventh day is not the first "blessing" of creation week. By the time God "rested" (shabath, root of Sabbath), He'd already blessed the living creatures created on the fifth day (1:20-23) and man (adam, or" humanity"), created "in His image" (vv. 26-28) on the sixth. The sixth day was God's creative peak, and His blessing the seventh indicates that creation's goal is our final rest in God.

When God blesses humanity, He addresses them personally (v. 28). On the heels of this intimate blessing of those shaped in His image and called to flourish, God ends His work and blesses the seventh day, resting with His creation. These two blessings interrelate and cor-

relate. The final touch, Sabbath, was not blessed for its own sake but for the sake of the blessed — those who would labor after God, imitating Him.

The blessed man followed by the blessed day establishes the priority to which Jesus spoke in Mark 2:27, 28. The one precedes the other, the latter enriches the former, and God, who blesses both, is Lord over all.

Like marriage, another divine institution woven into the created order prior to man's fall, Sabbath is neither named nor commanded in Genesis 2. Like that first marriage, it is simply, sublimely modeled by Divine initiative, its invitation extended to the first Adam and all who follow.

Delight in the Lord

Beyond Eden, sin distorts and robs people of God's best gifts, as we saw in Mark 2 and 10 with Sabbath and marriage. Our God-given "dominion" has been subverted by pride so that Sabbath is either overlooked or oppressive, its blessing lost. We need a change of heart.

God's creatures may forget or resist this blessed day, ignore it, or resent it, but to no avail. It remains. Sabbath is blessed and holy however I may choose to acknowledge it, or not. It's just the way the world is, the way God the Word made it. Sabbath continues to witness to the truth that our Creator and Redeemer is, relentlessly, for us:

- He offered Sabbath rest to a mixed multitude of former slaves just out of Egypt (Exodus 16).
- He commanded them to follow His Sabbath example, remembering to share this blessed day with male/female, slave/free, citizen/ foreigner even domestic animals (Exodus 20).
- He gave Israel a Sabbath song to celebrate His faithfulness and our flourishing (Psalm 92).

• He promised a coming covenant, Sabbath rest, and the ingathering of all peoples (Isaiah 56).

This biblical witness anticipates Christ's words that the Sabbath was made for us — God's work in Christ — and the new covenant written on the hearts of all who trust Him (Jeremiah 31:33; Hebrews 8:10). Jesus embodied Sabbath when He went about working miracles of restoration, especially on Sabbath. This kingdom, now and not yet, this King, come and coming, are Sabbath-shaped — a blessing of rest and restoration for the world (Hebrews 4:9; Matthew 11:28-30).

It does indeed take more than Divine example and command to live Sabbath-shaped lives. Our proud, restless hearts resist God's blessing. It takes the full operation of God in Christ through the Spirit to embody Isaiah's vision of lives set free from their own works and pursuits in order to call Sabbath a delight and to delight in Sabbath's Lord (58:13, 14).

Reading the stories of gospel, of creation, and of law and prophets, it's impossible for me to evade the scriptural weight of Sabbath-asblessing-for-us.

Sabbath blessing

Now the night is far past. I'm still sitting here, pecking away, lost in my Sabbath thoughts on the best and blessed day of the week.

I'm praying for us all to find that blessed delight this Sabbath and the next and the one after that. To delightfully model Sabbath blessing just as God the Father and His Son have shown us.

How Keeping Sabbath Has Changed My Life

I am blessed to have grown up in a Sabbathobserving family. So, there was never a time when the Sabbath was not a weekly event. For the first eighteen years of my life my parents were searching for a church which believed and practiced the teachings of the Bible, including the teaching to remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy. My mother wrote to the headquarters of numerous denominations asking for a list of their doctrinal beliefs. My father took multiple Bible correspondence courses.

The Sabbath has been precious in different way at various stages of my life. As a child it was a special time of closeness to my parents and brothers without interruption by the unending chores that filled the other days of the week. It was a day without school work, sports and clubs. It was a restful day to focus on the things of God together as a family.

During my teen years the Sabbath was a welcomed change from a busy routine. It also served as a common bond with other young people who shared a conviction about the Sabbath.

As a parent, and now a grandparent, I am much different than I would have been if I had not known about and practiced this gift that God blesses humanity with on the seventh day of each week.

I close with two quotes that I have adapted to the subject of the Sabbath. These words are adapted from Thom Rainer's book Why I Attend Church and applied to the Sabbath. Mr. Rainer is a former

president and CEO of LifeWay Christian Resources and author of a number of books on the church.

"In a culture that minimizes commitment and maximizes self-indulgence, I have learned the precious gift of the seventh-day Sabbath. I do not see resting on the Sabbath as a burden or legalistic commitment. I view it as joy—a time when I can give and serve, a time when I can focus more on others rather than myself. I observe the Sabbath to help others, to encourage others, to focus on priorities that are eternal in nature and to participate in worship. I remember the Sabbath to keep it holy because I love the Sabbath. I truly love the day God sanctified and made holy – His Sabbath. A big part of our union with Christ is following His example of obedience to His Father The Sabbath provides precious time for serving and ministering to others and glorifying our Lord Jesus Christ. HOW KEEPING GOD'S SABBATH HAS AFFECTED MY LIFE

I consider it an honor and a privilege as well as an opportunity to testify on how obedience to God through observing the Sabbaths weekly and annually gains favor from God the Father and His Son Jesus the Christ.

When I was 12 years of age I noticed the weekly Sabbath while reading an old Bible my mother gave to me. While sitting at the kitchen table reading Genesis 2:1 thru 3 I asked my mom to listen and I read these verses to her. I was very excited about what I had discovered and felt a bit of betrayal as well.

Mom had been raised by a Mennonite family and saw things from that perspective. I was very inquisitive when I asked her why we and everyone in our community was going to church on the first day of the week instead of going when God commanded?

Mom did not have any knowledge of Constantine 1, Emperor of Rome and she didn't know anything about the Roman Catholic Church either. The reply mom gave to me was 'Well I don't know son, I guess that's all been changed over the years'. At 12 years of age this was my first encounter regarding the Sabbath.

I began reading the Bible more and more and eventually came to Exodus 20 and encountered the Ten Commandments. I was jolted again when I read the fourth commandment, Exodus 20:8 thru 11. I may have squirmed a little but I suffered in silence as I pushed this to the back of my mind.

The more I read the Bible the more I wanted to read so as I continued reading lo and behold I got jolted

again when I read Deuteronomy 5:12 thru 15; the Ten Commandments. We were being taught and drilled on only nine commandments at Church; I was confused, perplexed and disturbed.

The community we lived in was as much of a Christian community as you could find. I was an active teenager in our little country church; no one spoke of the Sabbath, talked about it or practiced it, so I put the Sabbath out of my mind. We were a poor family living back in the mountains of W. VA. We never owned an automobile and the nearest store was five miles away so without any transportation available we had to walk.

After graduating from high school in 1959, I began working at a local woolen mill on the midnight shift. I bought a car and on my way to work I listened to the radio. I found the 'World Tomorrow' broadcast and became a regular listener.

Later along with my wife and children we moved to Ohio and I found employment at General Motors where I met another man that also listened to the 'World Tomorrow' broadcast. We became very close friends, we shared lots of biblical information and facts we learned from the Bible. We were both Sabbath observers and eventually we were baptized at the Worldwide Church of God.

At this time being married and having four children, my wife did not share my beliefs and moved out leaving me to raise our children alone; after I was baptized she left. I never knew what trials and being tested was all about until then.

My children and I moved to Georgia where I began working on construction. We attended a WCG in Atlanta and several of the ladies from church helped me some with my children and God gave me optimism that everything would work out. This was good to know because I was fired from many jobs for refusing to work on Friday night and Saturday. However, I always found a better job, praise be to God.

After a few years with all of this stress behind me believing God was with me I was finally set free from controversy so that I and my children could keep all of God's Sabbaths and could attend the Feast of Tabernacles. I never doubted God nor did I look back!

After the divorce and remarriage bylaws changed at WCG in 1974 I remarried again to a widow that also attended the same church. We were together happily until 2004 when she died of cancer.

I prayed diligently for her healing but she did not get well. I continued to serve in the Church and became a regular speaker at an independent Church of God for ten years.

I remarried in 2005 for the third time and we moved from Georgia to Tennessee.

I pastored an independent Church in Sevierville, TN for 1 ½ years and then retired. We now do 'Church at Home' and occasionally we visit with other brethren. Over all it has been a great life and I thank God for His many blessings. God meant it when He said 'I will never leave you nor forsake you'. I set my mind to trust and obey Him.

If it is a busy, busy week, I'll start praying for Shabbat to come quickly (as early as Tuesday some weeks!). Then, Thursday gets here and I'll do some prep work for Shabbat, especially if I have commitments for Friday morning. I like to have the house cleaned, clothes washed, meals done and even the sink cleaned out. I strive to have everything ready for Shabbat at least an hour or so before sunset though that does not always happen. Finally, it's here and I'm elated! A full day of rest and rejuvenation! Though I'm basically retired now, that schedule hasn't changed since our children were young and I learned the value of preparation day, even adding Thursday as a "pre" preparation day!

I love the Shabbat and praise and thank our Heavenly Father every week for giving us such an awesome gift! Those not knowing, understanding, respecting and guarding His Shabbat truly do not know what they are missing!

My Journey to Becoming a

Some people are blessed to be raised knowing about the Sabbath and what is special about it. Me? Well, I was raised in a good Christian home. To oversimplify things, the "Jews" are really only a small part of the whole...one-twelfth to be exact!

Paul tells us in Romans 11 that through belief in Jesus the Messiah, we non-Jews are grafted into Israel. This, in a nutshell, is the process that I went through close to 4 years ago now. I had to find out who God was actually giving these instructions to. I realized that they were given to all of Israel, both natural born and the ones who have come into the faith.

For us, it all started when my wife felt as if we should research the roots of Christmas. From there, we started watching videos from ministries like Passion for Truth and 119 Ministries who teach that the whole Word of God is applicable today if you believe in Messiah – specifically this part called the Torah.

I didn't buy any of it to begin with. I knew better than to believe all that I was hearing. I had taken some Bible classes online and I knew my stuff. I knew every bit of this was wrong. 

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
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
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
