A Forgotten Weapon of Spiritual Warfare

In many ways, our culture has had an impact on how we view attending church. For example, American society is very fast paced. We try to get everywhere as fast as we can so we can pursue our heartfelt desires. Among the hustle-bustle pace of our society, I believe that we are forgetting the power of fellowship. We come to church and leave so fast that we neglect to tend to each other. There is great power in working together. Let's take a moment and consider the example set by the early church.

"When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place" (Acts 2:1).

"And they continued stedfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship, and in breaking of bread, and in prayers" (Acts 2:42).

"And they, continuing daily with one accord in the temple, and breaking bread from house to house, did eat their meat with gladness and singleness of heart, Praising God, and having favour with all the people. And the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved" (Acts 2:46-47).

"And daily in the temple, and in every house, they ceased not to teach and preach Jesus Christ" (Acts 5:42).

"Carry each other's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ" (Galatians 6:2b).

These few examples help us see that the early church understood the power of fellowship. They prayed together, ate together, and visited one another with heart-felt affection. One way to restore the community feeling to our churches is through fellowship. Our focus has to change from showing up to church for service and then leaving as soon as

it ends. Over time, this can lead to making church impersonal. I can remember God correcting me in this area many years ago. How can we truly be a blessing to others in the body unless we take the time to get to know each other?

The influence of culture has also made us selfish. Some want personalized church where every song is the song they like, every sermon is on their favorite subject, and the altar service is done the way they want. Some people may read a few internet articles and deem themselves the expert on issues; this attitude will often disregard those who have toiled for years in obedience to God. Instead of these attitudes, let's gather for church with the heart of service for God's will, not our own. Consider the vision of your local church/ministry and what is best for the entire congregation. "Let nothing be done through strife or vainglory; but in lowliness of mind let each esteem other better than themselves" (Phil 2:3). Remember to show honor to those in leadership.

Other people need to hear what you and I have learned. At the same time, there are areas where we need to improve and learn from others. In our fellowship, we must be honest with areas of improvement.

I would like to share with you some history that will help you understand how fellowship helps in spiritual warfare. The Romans used to fight with a shield called a scutum. This shield was four feet tall and two feet wide. It was designed to cover the majority of a soldier's body. A group of Roman soldiers with these shields fought in a single unit. Those in the front linked their shields side by side. Those in the second row would lift their shields over the heads of the soldiers in front of them. The third row would to the same. This formed a "turtle" formation of protection as they marched forward.

In Ephesians 6:12-18, Paul talks about the shield of faith. The Greek word for shield is thuros. The root word for thuros means a door. It is a direct reference to the scutum shield from Roman times. This reveals to us a great spiritual truth.

In order for God's army to be effective, we must learn to link our faith with the faith of others. As Solomon said: "11 Also, if two lie down together, they will keep warm. But how can one keep warm alone? 12 Though one may be overpowered, two can defend themselves. A cord of three strands is not quickly broken" (Ecclesiastes 4:11-13).

When we read the Bible, God's people always worked together. Moses worked with Joshua and the elders under them. Jesus sent the 70 out two at a time. The Apostles worked together to resolve issues and transact Kingdom business. Paul worked with Timothy and the elders under them.

Each of us has strengths and weaknesses. We may struggle in areas that others have victory and vice versa. Working together helps us to sharpen one another. We were made to work together. It is good to have another perspective. When we fellowship, we impart counsel to one another, often without knowing it. My early days of spiritual growth were spent drinking in what others had to say so I could live God's way. Many times people didn't know what I was going through, but someone would usually say something in fellowship that I needed to hear.

Godly counsel from those with wisdom is imperative (Proverbs 25:22, 11:14, 26:4). Someone else has the encouraging word for us when we are weary (Isaiah 50:4). We all need affection and correction. People are going through trials and they need clues to help them persevere. We need to pray, study, and even eat together.

Outside of the local church, we can also link faith with believers from different backgrounds. We can link our faith with Seventh-Day Baptists, Church of God Seventh Day, Seventh Day Adventist, Church of God groups, and other Sabbath believers. Why not? We have so much in common. "For I long to see you, that I may impart unto you some spiritual gift, to the end ye may be established; That is, that I may be comforted together with you by the mutual faith both of you and me" (Romans 1:11-12).

Will we have differences? Of course we will. The Bible tells us: "As iron sharpens iron, so one person sharpens another" (Proverbs 27:17). When iron and iron hit each other, there are sparks. When we fellowship, there will be differences of personality, but we mature by working through these differences.

I encourage you all to go to church early. Stay late. Spend some time getting to know people you don't know right now. We need each other. Let's be the Body of Christ to each other and to the world.

"And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching" (Hebrews 10:24-25).

The Second Pillar of Wisdom—"Principle"

Isn't it amazing that our level of wisdom is directly connected to our intellectual ability and is highly affected by our surrounding, corresponding physical and financial conditions? The perfect way to have in-depth understanding of the ups and downs of our level of wisdom on a daily basis would be to check the chart of the "stock market" of our wisdom. Just as all of the critical elements come together to cause a decrease or increase of stock market values daily, and can be illustrated or traced by a chart, our level of wisdom can be illustrated as well. Through study and analysis of the background facts and the graph of a stock market, we easily see why and how the values have changed across time.

The same concept applies to the analyzing of our wisdom. We see that there are many corresponding factors that determine the level of wisdom that one possesses at any certain time. Our life is the best institution in which to learn how to acquire a higher level of wisdom; it is also the best laboratory for testing it. In order to determine the kind of life each one might pursue, we know that our purpose or intention is the cornerstone, or the starting point, which determines the direction and the level of successful results that will be acquired.

The second pillar of wisdom can be more easily understood using construction terminology. Recalling the Great Sichuan earthquake of 2008, we can still be touched with deep pain and sorrow when reflecting on the images of the many ruined buildings that come into our memory and where we know those uncountable precious lives were buried. At the same disaster site, there were many remaining buildings that withstood the devastation without having major damage. Why they didn't collapse brought even greater sorrow to the world because those buildings that remained standing are evi-

dence that the heart-breaking toll in lives need not have occurred. This heart breaking historical event illustrates how important it is to satisfy building codes while a structure is being built.

Comparing those ruined buildings with the ones that were left standing, we can see the major benefits of dedicated following of the well-tested principles of building construction versus jerry-rigged or slip-shod construction techniques. Unfortunately for the victims of substandard construction, the truth will always show itself when least expected and with disastrous results for the victims and for those who believe that erecting a safe building can be done by cutting corners or by manipulating the design, workers and materials.


If we apply these basic ideas to our daily business activities, we are able to see that our intentions and motivations are the helm for lives, ours and others. Knowledge of that ruling principle directs a person to successes or failures that will provide us with the ability to eliminate our endangering the lives of other people. We are then capable of proceeding, making a 180 degree turn, in a manner that benefits others who might be affected.

Nailing down our understanding of this pillar in a clear and precise way will help us to have better insight as to how to make much better decisions with regards to whom we believe and trust. It explains to us why we are sometimes incapable of making a right decision as to whether or not to trust a certain individual on a particular matter.

This pillar also determines who we follow or accept as a leader. In order to have a better understanding of how this pillar greatly affects our lives we can observe the political world. We do our best to determine who it is that we support by figuring out which candidate has similar principals or visions to our own through learning about them from the news sources, people we trust and people around

us as we interface with them. Verbal interface with audiences, both immediate and via various media outlets, is the only way for those politicians or candidates to cause people to understand who they are, what their positions are and why they are the best person for the position. In order to be recognized and win the election, they make promises about what they will do if they are elected. Political promises are not only sometimes unfeasible or unreasonable, but often times are deception designed to corrupt our wisdom through dissemblance of bad information.

For instance, it will become apparent how you will be able to identify good politicians and bad politicians by understanding the kind of principals that they have. The politician seals his or her own fate through their principal-based action, or the lack thereof. Life seems to entitle them whether they are good politicians or bad. It is hard to come to total agreement about true principles upon which to make judgments since "professionals" have compromised the standard of principles greatly, have separated law and morals as valid tools of discern-



ment, and because human society has exceedingly been manipulated by many deliberately-purposed leaders and their beliefs for thousands of years.

It doesn't take long to determine a person's intentions and motivations, no matter how much they try to hide all the possible ways they deceive, if you have sound principles. In order to have these sound principals we must first come to the point of putting our feelings and emotions aside, then observe and digest the available information from a multifaceted perspective, growing ourselves to a higher level of maturity and understanding. When we grow mature enough to apply the second pillar, principal, we can see how those "bad politicians" believe people to be "Dummies" or treat people as "Stupid." We can see how those "Bad Politicians" will eventually receive the effect of judgmental decisions by the average constituent sooner or later and are dumped or unseated, or sometimes even sentenced to jail, by an angry populace leading a movement to correct their mistake in judgment—if not outright criminality.

Everyone is moved to watch out for their own self-interests. Principals of safety govern our daily activities. They impress upon us the wisdom of making decisions to maintain or disconnect a relationship with someone or something. We don't need to learn philosophy in universities to understand what kind of principals we should have as we live our numbered days on this planet—provided that we build our first pillar strong. This is an on-going process which we will perfect daily throughout our lives, thus establishing our pillars of wisdom accordingly.

Having been told about principals from scripture, we as humans constantly fight against those principalities. We compare the principles we learn from the pillars of wisdom and try to arrive at better, if not Godly, principles to govern our lives, thus turning our backs upon the principals that determine to direct us away from wisdom. In order to have long lasting wisdom, building one's principles is considered second to having proper fear or awe of God, in my estimation.

Most people of faith understand that Sabbath is linked directly to the Bible's first chapter, its first story. We know and could tell, if we would, that God made all things in six days, then stopped working and set aside the seventh day as special from the start (Genesis 1 and 2:1-3).

In the creation story, we learn that Sabbath is the Day of Rest for a God who is never tired. Sadly, not all His people see the need of a weekly rest-day for themselves. In spite of Sabbath's uneven observance in these troubled and toilsome times, the Bible's 52 days-off each year remain available to all who recognize their need for the gift of rest and receive it by faith.

First then, if not foremost, the seventh-day is a Day of Rest for God who invites us to join Him in the weekly respite. But there is more than a first for this truth of Sabbath.

The same Sabbath that was a day of the Law is now a Day of Grace?

After its introduction in the second chapter, the seventh day is writ large again in the Bible's second book--a book of the law: "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy""—i.e., keep it set apart and separate. This command in Exodus prompts some to presume that Sabbath is little more than a piece of

the law.

We gladly affirm that a seventh day's rest from six days of labor was engraved on stone tablets at Mt. Sinai. There it joins other noble words of immense benefit for people, written and recommended by God: put Him first; don't blaspheme His name; honor your parents and treat others' lives, spouses, properties, and reputations with much respect. These commands are the top ten moral laws God gave to Israel or to anyone, prior to the gospel (Exodus 20:2-17).

Its written repository within the Decalogue, then, is no discredit to the Sabbath. To refute the seventh day's sanctity because it's a Day of the Law is to show ignorance of the role God ordained for His holy commandments in both old and new covenants. (Deuteronomy 6:24, 25; Hebrews 8:8-12 and 10:15-17).

Still there is more. Having said that Scripture's Sabbath was primarily a day of Rest and secondarily a day of the Law, we now state our climactic conviction about the Bible's one and only seventh-day Sabbath. An astonishing claim it is: ultimately, Sabbath is a day of Grace!

"What?" you exclaim with unfeigned surprise. "The same Sabbath that was a day of the Law is now a Day of Grace? How can that be? Isn't God's grace in direct contrast to His law? You have your work cut out for you on this one, sir!"


Stay with me, then, for three main reasons why Sabbath is a day of grace, and I'll let you go.

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- 1. Because it was celebrated by the Lord of grace and truth, Sabbath may be regarded as a day of grace in truth. Jesus regularly assembled on the seventh day for prayers (i.e., at the throne of grace), for learning (i.e., to grow in grace and truth), and for helping and healing others (i.e., grace to live and thrive). He taught that Sabbath was God's gift (i.e., grace) for all people, not just for Jews. (John 1:14; Luke 4:16; Mark 2:23-3:4; Matthew 11:28-12:13)
- 2. Because it is celebrated by resting and trusting—much like salvation is received, the seventh day is a dramatic re-enactment of our first love for Christ in whom we rest and trust to be saved. Sabbath and salvation, then, are alike at the core, the one a symbol and reminder of the other. Both flow from God's generous grace, and are neither attained nor maintained by works. (Ephesians 2:8, 9; Hebrews 4:1-11)
- 3. Because it reminds us of an eternal rest yet to be realized, Sabbath is a gift of God's ultimate grace. In its true nature of rest, grace and peace, every seventh day of the week stands as an enduring symbol of God's consummation until Christ returns at the end of the age. Then the weekly shadow will become the true Sabbath reality—an eternal totality of rest, grace, and peace. (Romans 6:23; Hebrews 4:1-11; Revelation 21:1-7)

Now we lay our pen to rest. We trust the Holy Spirit to complete the work by convicting us that Sabbath is much more than a day of rest and a day of moral law—although it is both.

Ultimately, Sabbath is a day of amazing grace because it illustrates God's unmerited favor toward us in Christ in astonishingly accurate ways, as set forth above. This grace-centered view of Sabbath matches well with a Christ-focused people of God saved and sustained by rest and peace in Him.

Sabbath-Post New Testament

This is the fifth part of a five-part series explaining why certain early documents that are claimed against the seventh-day Sabbath are misunderstood and not actually against it.

In my previous articles, I explained that the Greek word Κυριακήν did not mean Sunday and many have misinterpreted writings from the Didache and Ignatius of Antioch's Letter to the Magnesians as endorsing Sunday. Thus, the earliest claimed post-New Testament documents cited as "proof" that the seventh-day Sabbath was done away truly did not do so.

Is there other proof?

Yes.

If Jesus and/or His apostles did away with the Sabbath as many claim, then it would be reasonable to conclude that the later faithful disciples would not keep it. Yet, other records and writings demonstrate that the faithful did continue to keep the seventh-day Sabbath.

It is well known that from the first century until about 135 A.D. the first fifteen bishops/pastors of Jerusalem all kept the seventh-day Sabbath and were all circumcised Jews (Eusebius. The History of the Church, Book III, Chapter V, Verses 2,3.& Book IV, Chapter 5, Verses 2-4, pp. 45, 71).

Although they have their own biases, even the historians Philip Schaff and Johann Gieseler correctly noted:

"The Jewish Christians, at least in Palestine, conformed as closely as possible to the venerable forms of the cultus of their fathers, which in truth were divinely ordained, and were an expressive type of the Christian worship. So far as we know, they scrupulously observed the Sabbath, the annual Jewish



feasts, the hours of daily prayer, and the whole Mosaic ritual" (Schaff, Philip, History of the Christian Church, Chapter 9. Oak Harbor, WA: Logos Research Systems, Inc. 1997. This material has been carefully compared, corrected, and emended according to the 1910 edition of Charles Scribner's Sons by The Electronic Bible Society, Dallas, TX, 1998.)

"While the Jewish Christians of Palestine retained the entire Mosaic law, and consequently the Jewish festivals, the Gentile Christians observed also the Sabbath and the passover (1 Cor. v. 6-8), with reference to the last scenes of Jesus' life, but without Jewish superstition (Gal. iv. 10; Col. ii. 16)" (Gieseler, Johann Karl Ludwig. A text-book of church history, Volume I, Chapter II. New York: Harper & brothers. Date 1857-80).

It is known that early Jewish Christians did keep the Sabbath and biblical holy days. And as prophesied by Isaiah (Isaiah 56:1-7), so did the faithful Gentile Christians (and the Isaiah prophecy still has future application).

Ignatius and Polycarp

The faithful Gentile Christians were also keeping the Sabbath outside of Jerusalem. In the early second century, Pastor/Bishop Ignatius of Antioch wrote:

...to Polycarp, bishop of the Smyrnaeans...So approving am I of your godly mind, which is as it were, grounded upon an unmovable rock, that my praise exceeds all bounds...Do not let those who appear to be trustworthy yet who teach strange doctrines baffle you. Stand firm, like an anvil... Grace will be...always...with Polycarp [Ignatius. Letter to Polycarp. In: Holmes, pp. 194-201].

And according to the later testimonies of Irenaeus, Polycrates, and Tertullian, the leader of the Sabbath -keeping Smyrnaeans [The Martrydom of Polycarp. Verse 8.1. In: Holmes, p. 233], Polycarp, did just that in Asia Minor.

Polycarp also taught that Christians should keep the commandments [Polycarp. Letter to the Philippians. In: Holmes, pp. 206-221].

"And on the following sabbath he said; 'Hear ye my exhortation, beloved children of God. I adjured you when the bishops were present, and now again I exhort you all to walk decorously and worthily in the way of the Lord...Watch ye, and again Be ye ready, Let not your hearts be weighed down, the new commandment concerning love one towards another, His advent suddenly manifest as of rapid lightning, the great judgment by fire, the eternal life, His immortal kingdom. And all things whatsoever being taught of God ye know, when ye search the inspired Scriptures, engrave with the pen of the Holy Spirit on your hearts, that the commandments may abide in you indelible.' "[Life of Polycarp, Chapter 24. (1889) from J. B. Lightfoot, The Apostolic Fathers, vol. 3.2, pp. 488-506]

(Note: While some claim Polycarp also kept Sun-

day, that appears to be a later edition to the text [Monroy MS. The Church of Smyrna: History and Theology of a Primitive Christian Community. Peter Lang edition, 2015, p. 31].)

According to the The Martyrdom of Polycarp by the Smyrnaeans [The Martyrdom of Polycarp, Bishop of Smyrna, Verses 7.1 & 8.1. Charles H. Hoole's 1885 translation] and other sources [Sozomen. THE ECCLESIASTICAL HISTORY OF SOZOMEN. Book VII, Chapter XIX.], Christians in Polycarp's area kept the Sabbath after he died.

And since Polycarp referred to Ignatius as 'blessed' and endorsed Ignatius' letters in his Letter to the Philippians [Polycarp. Letter to the Philippians, verse 13.2. In: Holmes, p. 219], it is logical to conclude that Ignatius was faithful to the same teachings and practices that Polycarp did.

Theophilus

In the late second century, Pastor/Bishop Theophilus of Antioch wrote:

"And on the sixth day God finished His works which He made, and rested on the seventh day from all His works which He made. And God blessed the seventh day, and sanctified it; because in it He rested from all His works which God began to create...Moreover, [they spoke] concerning the seventh day, which all men acknowledge; but the most know not that what among the Hebrews is called the "Sabbath," is translated into Greek the "Seventh" (έβδομάς), a name which is adopted by every nation, although they know not the reason of the appellation...God having thus completed the heavens, and the earth, and the sea, and all that are in them, on the sixth day, rested on the seventh day from all His works which He made" (Theophilus of Antioch. To Autolycus, Book 2, Chapters XI, XII, XIX. Translated by Marcus Dods, A.M. Excerpted from Ante-Nicene Fathers, Volume 2. Edited by Alexander Roberts & James Donaldson. American Edition, 1885, pp. 99,102).

The early faithful Gentile Christians kept the Sabbath. Until the early third century, there was harmony between the faithful Christians in Antioch and

Asia Minor.

Conclusion

Early Jewish and Gentile Christians kept the seventh day Sabbath. The faithful did not believe that the Sabbath was done away.

As explained in early parts of this article, neither the Didache or Ignatius' Letter to the Magnesians actually mention the term Sunday or directly refer to the first day of the week. The Didache is not an endorsement of early Sunday observance.

Ignatius, himself, would have had to be a supporter of the seventh day Sabbath and would not have written against it. Nor, if properly translated, do Ignatius' letters ever truly write against the seventh day sabbath--instead they endorse the concept that Christians are to keep the Sabbath in accordance with the commandments and the Lord's way of living, but not according to the ways endorsed by unbiblical Jewish tradition.

There is no evidence whatsoever that any who professed Christ regularly worshiped on Sunday when Ignatius was alive. The simple fact is that Ignatius' writings do not support the idea that the early New Testament Church observed Sunday.

The Greek expression he used in Magnesians (κυριακήν ζωντες) simply did not mean Sunday when Ignatius wrote his letters. And there is no other contemporaneous reference that any professing Christian at the time of Ignatius observed Sunday. Available evidence (including the Bible, i.e. Acts 13:42-44; Hebrews 4:9) clearly supports the idea that early Christians kept the seventh day Sabbath.

The first clear reference to Sunday worship, even according to Roman Catholic sources, was from Justin Martyr [Slater T. Sunday. Transcribed by Scott Anthony Hibbs. The Catholic Encyclopedia, Volume XIV. Published 1912. New York: Robert Appleton Company. Nihil Obstat, July 1, 1912. Remy Lafort, S.T.D., Censor. Imprimatur. +John Cardinal Farley, Archbishop of New York]. Yet he held so many heretical positions [e.g. see Justin Martyr. The First Apology and Letter to Trypho], it makes no sense to this author that any could truly consider him to be a true Christian.

On the other hand, Polycarp and those faithful Christians who remained in Asia Minor and Antioch did continue to keep the Sabbath for centuries after Jesus died. Faithful Christians still keep the Sabbath to this day.

When we were born God had already placed human nature into our being. When we opened our eyes for the first time knowledge began to dwell within us; our ears heard sounds and thus knowledge entered through the sense of hearing, very elementary at first. Gradually more understanding using our sense of taste, smell, and touch began to develop.

We were born into a world that had settled into various types of local civilizations. Some customs and traditions were good but not all of them. We accepted ideas and beliefs of our world taking for granted without question everything was good and normal.

Human nature is so complex very few people realize the concept of its meaning. Human nature has two sides, a physical natural side and a spiritual side. 1 Corinthians 15:46 NKJ - 46 "However, the spiritual is not first, but the natural, and afterward the spiritual."

At the beginning our natural spiritual side is pure selfish vanity which loves and tends to exalt one-self, it is self-centered and greedy; this is natural and normal! A baby thinks only about eating, sleeping, and clothes being changed. Later in life God gives us understanding as written in Job 32:8 NKJ - 8 "But there is a spirit in man, and the breath of the Almighty gives him understanding."

Blameless is the way of God's invisible, inexorable, spiritual law. Good is the way of God's law of love

as written in I Corinthians 13:1 thru 12 NKJ. 1 "Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I have become sounding brass or a clanging cymbal. 2 And though I have the gift of prophecy, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and though I have all faith, so that I could remove mountains, but have not love, I am nothing. 3 And though I bestow all my goods to feed the poor, and though I give my body to be burned, but have not love, it profits me nothing. 4 Love suffers long and is kind; love does not envy; love does not parade itself, is not puffed up; 5 does not behave rudely, does not seek its own, is not provoked, thinks no evil; 6 does not rejoice in iniquity, but rejoices in the truth; 7 bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. 8 Love never fails. But whether there are prophecies, they will fail; whether there are tongues, they will cease; whether there is knowledge, it will vanish away. 9 For we know in part and we prophesy in part. 10 But when that which is perfect has come, then that which is in part will be done away. 11 When I was a child, I spoke as a child, I understood as a child, I thought as a child; but when I became a man, I put away childish things. 12 For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then face to face. Now I know in part, but then I shall know just as I also am known."

On the physical human nature side there are the five senses: seeing, hearing, tasting, smelling, and feeling. Thus human nature exerts an automatic, impulsive pull toward sensations of pleasure such

as: selfishness, greed, vanity, jealousy, envy, hatred, lusts with the wrong desires of the flesh. More times than not these pleasures are injurious, harmful and immoral as they pull us toward self-gratification. These five senses can lead to serious problems of many kinds so they must be controlled; but where do we begin?

The flesh is weak and with human nature it's natural to resent and resist authority. Some children tend to resist the authority of their parents sometimes at a very early age. If not corrected such children will grow up with a natural attitude of hostility, they don't want to be good, they dislike any authority, toward others and toward God. Parental guidance with close monitoring is wise! Proverbs 22:6 NKJ "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it."

The world today is lacking in spiritual knowledge needing happiness, peace and joy; which started many centuries ago. We are witnessing today a world that is unhappy, frustrated and insecure filled with hate, crime, violence, broken homes, quarreling families, sickness and disease, failures and tragedies. The daily news reports wars between the nations; and for nearly six thousand years



there has been only curses, war, strife and violence, frustration and failure. Without God man has failed and will continue to fail, it seems that nearly all the gains made by civilizations are eventually destroyed by war.

God is love, He is not the author of these problems and all of the confusion in the world.

We receive faith, hope and love on the physical level through family affection etcetera, so let it be known that the spiritual level and the physical level are very different. Our understanding of 1 Corinthians 13:13 is supplemented by God Himself, He opens our minds through His influence by His Holy Spirit.

God teaches us faith, hope and love on a spiritual level through His Word as we are not born with these qualities. Without love we are nothing! I Corinthians 13:13 NKJ. "And now abide faith, hope, love, these three; but the greatest of these is love."

Love travels a certain road; a road of peace, happiness, confident assurance, security, well-being, enjoyment, every good thing the heart desires and needs.

God has made humans free moral agents, and allotted nearly six thousand years for mankind to make choices; whether to accept God's laws for government, and to be ruled by God's law of love or blunder along going Satan's way.

Born again is to be born of a resurrection! These are the saints, people who repented of their carnal human nature, those who cried out to God to change their nature, and fill them with the matchless supreme gift of His divine love through His Holy Spirit and are promised immortality.

The one thousand year period is the beginning of the Kingdom of God on this earth. John 3:3 NKJ. "Jesus answered and said to him, 'Most assuredly, I say to you, unless one is born again (resurrected), he cannot see the kingdom of God.' "



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tion 2:26, 27 NKJ. 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
er) for our sins, and not for ours only but also for the whole world."

OBEDIENCE IN THE SO-CALLED "NEW TESTAMENT"

"If your brother sins, go and show him his fault in private; if he listens to you, you have won your brother."

This is written to all the brothers and sisters out there who I may never even meet.

There are quite a few. There are so many who strive to learn our Heavenly Father's ways yet come upon roadblocks which are hard to get past. One of these roadblocks has to do with Yahweh's laws in the so-called "New Covenant" scriptures (Jeremiah 31:33, Hebrews 8:10 profess what the "real new covenant" is).

As the title verse indicates, if you believe a brother sins, we are told to point it out going on the premise that if something is not in accord with scripture it would be sinful, not only for his/her sake but for those who may look to them for instruction. I'm referring to items which can be proven from scriptures to be correct. I am so thankful for the brothers and sisters over the years who have shown me where I've been lacking. I am certain there are areas still, but I continue striving and appreciate the input of others.

Sadly because of pride and other issues, many cannot put their age-old beliefs on the back burner and look at scriptures "as a child" any longer. We are in the end times and are told "knowledge will increase." How can "knowledge increase" if one does not have a soft heart to learn, or has too much pride to admit he or she may have been wrong for "x"

number of years? "Knowledge increasing" can NOT be new learners of truth because for something to "increase," there must be something to start with.

Many years ago, I (like many folks even today)

believed in the "two law doctrine" (one which was inside the ark to last forever and the book of the law on the outside to be replaced). - If the Messiah kept His (and our) Father's com-

mands (John 15:10) and we are to walk as He walked (1 John 2:6), we also are to keep the Father's commands.


The Messiah could not change His Father's instructions (John 5:19). If you say you know Him and do NOT keep His commands, scripture says you're a "liar" (1 John 2:4) which is pretty strong language.

• Even the sacrificial laws were in effect AFTER MESSIAH'S death (Acts 21:23-26). NOTE: The temple was destroyed at some point later than this at which time animal sacrifices could no longer be performed. The important thing to note is that they were performed AFTER the Messiah was killed and those laws were not part of the "Big Ten."

There is a website out there (https://www.scripturenews2use.org) which focuses on folks learning for themselves what scriptures say in accord with Philippians 2:12 to work out our OWN salvation. How? "...with fear and trembling...." It also exposes many falsities presented every weekend (Sabbath AND Sundays) at churches and assemblies which actually violate His words.
