EDITORIAL



Of Politics and Thanksgiving

November is the month of elections and thanksgiving—and for me the two are connected.

Every four years we endure months of hearing each candidate denegrating the others and proclaiming that he will solve all the problems that haven't been solved by previous administrations and that won't be solved by his opponents. For many citizens it's all such a turnoff that they want no part in the process. The majority of eligible voters do not vote.

To be sure, political races always boil down to a choice between two or more human beings who are imperfect—by anybody's standard. And no one candidate, if elected, is going to change the basic course of the nation; the best he can do is nudge it a little in one direction or the other. Hence the practical question for the electorate is this: In which direction is a given candidate going to nudge our ship of state?

Some of the issues of this year's campaign (undoubtedly history by the time you read this) are of particular concern to Christians: abortion, pornography, the nation debt, separation of church and state, national child care, to name a few. In many of these, candidates hold opposing views; and during their terms of office those elected will move our country (however slightly) in the direction of their convictions. In particular, the next president will very possibly appoint three new justices to the Supreme Court. His views will influence his choice of justices; their views will influence the outcome of court decisions for many years to come. Those decisions will affect Christians for decades.


While all Christians are affected by (and complain about) government, they do not agree about how involved they should be in selecting it. While many evangelicals, including many Sabbathkeepers, have become very active in recent years, others insist the Bible condemns worldly politics. Some believe that if they vote for a candidate, they are responsible for everything that candidate does in office. Others believe that if they don't vote against a candidate and he gets into office as a result, they are responsible for everything he does. Some insist that it's all for naught because God sets up kings. Others counter that God could bless us with good rulers, but if we don't care who they are, why should He.

In all this, I find reasons for great thanksgiving. Unlike the totalitarian, pagan Roman regime of New Testament times, unlike most governments on earth today and during previous centuries, our political system allows us to speak our minds freely and to participate or not as we choose. Whatever our individual views, we can be thankful that we are free to indulge them and that no one is trying to force us to do otherwise. What a great blessing we are given! Let us thank the Creator for his grace and goodness.

Baptists Convene at Historic Site

Last August over 650 Seventh Day Baptists from across North America gathered at Salem College, Salem, West Viginia, a town rich with Sabbatarian history. The conference coincided with the centennial year of the college, which was established in 1888. Under the leadership of President Herbert E. Saunders, the 176th session drew delegates representing 60 congregations from 26 states as well as Canada, Finland, and Germany. Offical business conducted during the week included the acceptance into the conference of four new churches (Santa Barbara, Calif., Lake Elsinore, Calif., Charleston, S.C., and Jefferson City, Mo.) According to Executive Secretary Dale D. Thorngate, "Historically Seventh Day Baptists have been largely a rural people. But the majority of churches established in the last 20 years have been in metropolitan areas. Our major growth areas are in cities, in the south and west, and in Africa and Asia."

Delegates affirmed previous resolutions on world peace and urged members to boycott the movie "The Last Temptation of Christ" along with other products of its producer, Universal Studios. David and Bettie Pearson, missionaries in Malawi, Central Africa, since 1954, were honored by the conference. Mrs. Pearson is a 1953 graduate of Salem College.

Dr. Thomas McElwain, an anthropoligist and native West Virginian whose wife is Finnish, reported on evangelistic outreach activities in Sweden and Russia as well as in Finland, where he serves as a missionary. On Friday afternoon he

was ordained.

On Saturday morning, August 13, General Conference officals presented Salem College with two bronze plaques which commemorate the involvement of Seventh Day Baptists in the founding of the institution; both plaques are gifts of the Daytona Beach, Fla,. SDB church. In companion ceremonies, as part of the college's centennial celebrations, President Ronald E. Othl conferred an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree on General Conference President Herbert E. Saunders, a 1962 graduate of the college.

Assuming the presidency of the 300-year-old denomination for the 1988-89 year is Luan S. Ellis, a high school mathematics teacher from Alfred, N.Y. She will represent the church at various church and ecumenical functions and preside over the next general conference, which will be held during August 6-12, 1989, in Portland, Oregon. Her theme for the year: Share the Joy.

Chosen as president-elect (to serve the 1988-89 term) is Joseph Samuels, a native of Jamaica who now pastors the SDB church in Plainfield,

The community of Salem was settled by Seventh Day Baptists in 1792. In 1888 they took the initiative in establishing a college in central West Virginia. Samuel Huffman, pastor of the congregation in nearby Lost Creek at that time, resigned his pastorate to ride on horseback through the hills and valleys promoting the idea of a college, recruit-

ing students, and raising funds. Although most of the founders were SDBs, the college was founded as an independent, nonsectarian institution supported by private funds.

Remember the Sabbath

Editor's note: The following article is excerpted from a 108-page manuscript completed earlier this year. Intended primarily for individuals not yet convicted about the Sabbath, the material is presented in question and answer format. The author attends the Chicago congregation of the Church of God, International.

Didn't Christ set us free from the bondage of having to observe the Sabbath?

This question seems to assume that Sabbathkeeping is some sort of bondage. But just the opposite is true! The Sabbath commandment sets us free from bondage — at least during that one day each week which God has designated as the Sabbath. That one day of the week offers us joyful rest — not slave labor!

If the fourth commandment places us in any sort of bondage, it is the "other segment" of that commandment that does it; namely the part that says, "...six days shalt thou labour, and do all thy work..." (Exodus 20:9). That part of the commandment enjoins us to labor for most of the week (in order to become economically productive). So, in a sense we are under a sort of "bondage" or compulsion during all of the week except for the Sabbath day!

But on the Sabbath we are free to rest, free to worship for as many hours of that day as we may wish, and free to fellowship with our Sabbathkeeping, Christian friends, and free to enjoy "Oneg Shabbat" (an Old Testament, Hebrew expression meaning "the Delight of the Sabbath"). Those wonderful liberties, given to us as gifts from God, should never be viewed as bondage! With



these great liberties in mind it is no wonder Christ said that the Sabbath was made for man and not man for the Sabbath.

If some people view Sabbathkeeping as bondage, they are missing the whole point of the Sabbath. Their views, however, may be a carry over from the mistaken idea that the Bible requires us to comply with scores of tedious rules concerning Sabbath observance. But the scores of rules they envision simply are not found anywhere in the Bible.

What answers do most Sundaykeeping ministers give when asked about the need to observe the Sabbath?

Quite often when Sundaykeeping ministers are asked about the Sabbath, they merely say that people who insist on observing the "Jewish Sabbath" are all "hung up" on one aspect of the Bible; that they are "legalistic Judaizers;" and that they are depending on their own works for salvation rather than trusting on the grace of God. Some will add that the law of God has been abolished.

Often those responses from ministers are sufficient to silence the questioner. Few questioners will ever check out those responses or allegations to see whether they contain even the tiniest, barest shred of truth. And in most cases the minister really doesn't know much about it himself; he's only repeating what he's heard from someone else.

Strangely enough, however, if those same ministers are asked what they believe about obedience to any one of the other of the Ten Commandments, such as the one concerning murder or theft or idolatry, they will not give the same kind of reckless response as they do concerning the Sabbath. They will not say that those who insist on not

murdering others are all "hung up" on that one "Jewish law," or that they are "legalistic Judaizers," or that they are depending on their own works of obedience for their salvation. Nor will they likely respond by saying that those old "Jewish" laws have been abolished.

We ask: "Why is it so wrong to obey God's Sabbath commandment, but so right to obey the other nine commandments???" If the law (e.g. the Ten Commandments) has been done away, as so many ministers teach, why then is it considered to be "right" to obey any of those Ten Commandments? On the other hand if the Ten Commandments have not been abolished, why is it then considered wrong to faithfully obey all ten of them, including the Sabbath commandment?

Should the civil laws of the land enforce Sabbathkeeping?

Roger Williams, the founder of Rhode Island, was America's greatest proponent of religious freedom. He suggested that the civil law should never try to legislate or enforce any of the first four of the Ten Commandments, but that the government probably should pass laws that

would enforce the final six of the Ten Commandments. This is surely excellent advice for any system of government.

By the way, we might mention that Roger Williams is considered by historians to have been one of America's finest colonial statesmen. And he was a statesman who fully realized that the seventh day of the week is the true biblical Sabbath and he valiantly defended the observance of the Sabbath.

Most Sabbathkeepers in the United States take a strong stand that the government should not make any laws which would tend to enforce or favor the keeping of the Sabbath or of any other day. Under a democratic system of government, it is best for the civil law to constrain itself to protecting everyone's legitimate religious liberties. The government should not make laws which tend to favor one religion above another, including the "religion" of secular humanism.

We strongly support the civil rights of Sundaykeepers to observe Sunday, and of other religious groups to observe their special days in complete freedom of conscience. We only ask for that same right. But any law which enforces or unduly favors the observance of Sunday is a beastly thing and a mark to be avoided.

If the Sabbath is still to be kept why didn't Jesus plainly and emphatically say something very specific such as, "My followers must always continue to faithfully observe the Sabbath forever?"

The most obvious answer to that question is that there was no need for Him to make any such statement. No disciple of Jesus nor any other religious Jew of His generation needed to be told to observe the Sabbath. They all knew that Sab-

bath observance was commanded by God as part of His eternal law. No one even questioned that! In fact the Sabbath commandment was probably the most strictly observed of all the commandments of God during the lifetime of Jesus. Religious Jews kept the Sabbath rigidly and scrupulously, even to the point of making it into a burdensome task, replete with numerous rules not found in the Scriptures!

All the various sects of the Jews agreed that the Sabbath must be faithfully observed. Jesus, therefore, spent His efforts not in telling the people to do what they were already doing to the extreme, but rather He spent His time trying to get them to better understand how the Sabbath should be observed. Jesus taught that the Sabbath should be kept with love, mercy and good works as some of the chief elements, and not merely with harsh or petty rabbinical regulations.

It is interesting that while the New Testament mentions Jews who broke various other commandments: stealing, committing adultery, coveting, dishonoring parents, etc., there is no record of any Jews (whether Christian convert or otherwise) who did not keep the Sabbath during New Testament times. There was just no need to teach anyone which day was God's Sabbath or that the Sabbath ought to be observed by God's people.

No New Testament writer, nor anyone who was spoken of in the New Testament, ever raised the question of whether the Sabbath should still be observed; and no one ever questioned which day of the week was the true Sabbath. Likewise, Christians today should need no special reminder or new commandment from Christ in order to convince us to keep the Sabbath. We already have both the Old and the New Testaments as our teachers.

We could not hope for more excellent teachers than these! Their pages continually remind us in one way or another to "Remember the Sabbath...."

Does New Testament terminology relating to the Sabbath and to Sunday tell us anything of significance about those days?

All of the New Testament was written well after the resurrection of Christ and it was written by several different authors. With those facts in mind it is most enlightening to realize that in all of the New Testament writings the Sabbath was still always referred to as "the Sabbath." It was never merely referred to as "the seventh day of the week" nor as "the former Sabbath" nor by any other such down-graded designation!

On the other hand Sunday is always, merely designated as "the first day of the week." It is never called "the new Sabbath" or "the Christian holy day" or "the day of worship" or by any other elevated title whatsoever! In fact the day is not given any sort of a name or title at all!

Was there some kind of a mass conspiracy on the part of all of the writers of the New Testament to try to hide "the fact" that the Sabbath had been changed? Or could it be that the Sabbath was not changed after all?

It is interesting to note that after Christ's resurrection the apostles disputed with unconverted Jews about a number of things, but nowhere do we ever read that any Jews ever charged them with not keeping the Sabbath commandment!

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Christian Meditation (CM) is entirely different from Transcendental Meditation (TM). It is not silent prayer, nor Biblereading, nor sermon listening, not group worship, nor music appreciation. It is a quiet hour free from noise pollution. It is a union of Creator and creature through God-man. This art that has been lost for centuries is being rediscovered just recently. CM will help Christians to regain peace, rest, health, and life eternal. It will take you to the "third heaven," but you must learn how to take the first step walking with your Heavenly Father as Enoch did preparing you to enter into the New Jerusalem.



EDWARD BARRAR— NEW ZEALAND PIONEER

At the age of 84, Edward Barrar is still acitive as the pastor of the Seventh Day Baptist church in Christ-church New Zealand, and as editor of the SDB prophetic monthly magazine *The Gospel Messenger*, which he began publishing in 1942.

Born in 1903 at Timaru, New Zealand, to a railway employee and godly, powerful mother, he left school and by age twelve went to work in a fitting and turning shop. At 16 he knew enough about "horseless carriages" to be trusted driving the town's first fire engine.

At 18, Edward went to sea on the sailing ship Lotty Bennett and later on the cable-laying schooner HMS Iris. He recalls an incident aboard the first ship. "When at sea I dropped my Bible, (which my Mother had wrapped in my pajamas.) When it fell out I became a laughing stock for the 14 men at sea."

He married Ivy Burson at age 20 and became father of Ron, Dorothy, and Daniel. After leaving the sea, Edward turned to his old hobby, boxing, and became an instructor; later he began manufacturing racing bikes. However, the Lord had other plans for young Edward. Illness forced him to sell the prospering business and move back to Timaru with his young family. It was at this point of his life that by reading a novel, *The Eternal City*, given by an aunt, he became interested in quotations from the Scripture. Further Bible study led to his conversion, and soon thereafter, to the truth of the Sabbath. His wife, who had been brought up as a first-day Baptist said, "No one keeps Sabbath on Saturday"! Edward replied, "I don't care if I am the only person in the world keeping Sabbath on Saturday, I am going to do so because that



is what the Bible tells me." Even a visit from the Baptist minister couldn't dissuade him.

To support his young family Edward turned to whatever work was available: mail run, taxi service, trapping rabbits, etc. Later the family moved to Christchurch, where they grew and sold flowers and vegetables. It was there that Edward felt called to the ministry and by correspondence gained a degree in theology. The first meeting place of the young SDB church was a rented room over a shoe shop, corner of Worster and Manchester. In 1944 the present property at 16 Livingstone St. was purchased and after rebuilding became the SDB chapel. The original wooden building, damaged by fire, has since been replaced by the present masonry structure.

During World War II, Pastor Barrar was able to hitch a passage on a troop ship (with 5,000 marines on board) to Australian Sabbatarian brethern. These early contacts were renewed in the mid-1970's and led in time to the founding of the SDB work in Australia. In 1978, Barrar represented the New Zealand churches at the 1978 SDB World Federation meeting in the U.S.

At present Pastor Barrar lives in a new 2-bedroom cottage overlooking the Pacific Ocean; it's on an unnamed peak the locals call "Reverend's Roost." The water supply comes from a rainwater storage tank, while electricity is generated by wind power. Besides serving his church and editing The Gospel Messenger, Barrar is collecting material for a book on early Christian doctrines as related to present SDB beliefs. His son Ronald, a former missionary to Malawi, just ended a term as president of the Australa-

sian SDB Conference. Daniel is a sheep farmer and lay leader in the Christchurch congregation; and sister Dorthy is a homemaker and former Bible School teacher and organist. There are ten grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

Recognizing his many years of service, Link, the Australasian SDB Conference paper, honored Pastor Edward Barrar as Senior Pastor in 1987.

Second Annual BSA Sabbath

FROM THE SEVENTH DAY COMMUNITY

Sabbathkeepers at White House

Watching as President Reagan signed into law a bill that provides reparations to Japanese-Americans interned in work camps during WW II were six Seventh-day Adventists. Susumu and Sumi Emori and their four children spent time at a camp at Rohr, Arkansas during the war. Today the retired parents work at Loma Linda University (LLU); their daughter, Dr. Helen, is dean of the Nursing School at LLU; Grace works at the U.S. Public Health Service's Center for Disease Control; Walter is a physician; and David is a computer specialist. Each will receive \$20,000 tax free. The family plans to give its \$120,000 to LLU for nursing scholarships. Grace said, "We don't want to benefit personally from the new law. We're just so thankful for our religious liberty and for the educational opportunities each of us has had."

Oppression in Nigeria

According to a report from Pastor R. N. Attai of the Apostolic Church of God (Seventh Day) in Nigeria, the government of Cross River State has banned public religious crusades. As a result the church has turned to house-to-house evangelism and tract distribution.

Soviet Publishing Continues

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Last year Review and Herald Publishing Assn. (R & H) published in Russian a full-color journal entitled "Is There Faith in God in Russia?" The publication was so well received in the U.S.S.R. that R & H is produc-

ing a second edition. In response to needs expressed by Soviet leaders, the magazine will be directed to youth and will stress family issues and the need to stop smoking.

Meanwhile negotiations between R & H and the Party's Central Committee continue regarding the joint publishing plant in the Soviet Union. Also, editorial offices for SDAs were opened last year on the campus of the new Soviet SDA seminary at Tula.

During August, Review and Herald shipped 14 tons of printed material to the USSR. Sent mainly for pastors were 450 sets of the Adventist Commentary, 200 sets of Barclay's Commentary in Russian, 400 Ukrainian Bible Dictionaries, and a great deal of other material. Valued at \$232,000, the shipment was paid for by donations from Adventists in North America.

Release of Soviet Prisoners

Keston College news service continues to report the release of people imprisoned in the Soviet Union for religious activity. According to unconfirmed reports the following Adventists have been freed from labor camps: Olga Barinova, I. Kus, Pavel Raksha, and Yladimir Shelkov, son of the late leader of the True and Free Adventist Church. However, Keston points out that sometimes Soviet authorities claim to have freed prisoners who were merely transferred from labor camp to compulsory labor or to exile in a district far from their homes.

Hispanic Pastor to Mexico

A leader among the Hispanic brethren of the Church of God (Seventh Day) in the U.S., Pastor Lorenzo Arroyo has accepted a position as instructor for the Seminary of the Church of God (Seventh Day) in Mexico. A graduate of Summit School of Theology at the church's Denver headquarters, Arroyo has been pastor of the San Jose congregation of the Church of God since 1982. Born in Washington D.C., Arroyo earned a degree in psychology at San Jose State University. The new pastor at the San Jose church is Elder William Umana.

Venezuelan Official Addresses Adventist Leaders

Dr. Janes Caballero, minister of justice and religion in Venezuela, addressed approximately 200 ministers and administrators of the Inter-American Division of the SDA church in June. Caballero told the delegates that Christians should contribute to the development of a world in which justice, peace and love reigns. According to a report in Adventist Review, he also expressed an interest in the seventh-day Sabbath.

Adventist Prison Ministries

Currently SDA volunteers are active in 200 of the 850 penal institutions in North America. One conference reports that in its territory, more than 300 prisoners have become church members. The growth in prison ministries led to a national meeting of Adventists involved in prison work. The group recommended that these ministries be brought under the authority of local conferences

and that an Association of Adventist Prison Ministries be established.

LLU Student on AMA Board

Rebecca Patchin, member of the Loma Linda University School of Medicine's class of 1989 has been selected as the student trustee to the American Medical Association Board of Trustees. The second woman to ever sit on the board, Patchin will serve a one-year nonvoting term.

SDA Church Reaches Out to Campuses

More than 40,000 Adventists world-wide are students at non-Adventist colleges. To reach them, the church established the Ministry to College and University Students Committee (MICUS), which is to be a cooperative effort of many departments. MICUS will organize seminars and develop resource materials for chaplains and ministers serving students on non-Adventist campuses.

ON THE LEGAL FRONT

The following are adapted from the Summer issue of Court Report, published by the SDA church.

In EEOC v. Ithaca Industries, the US 4th Circuit Court of Appeals reversed a gross misreading of Title VII of the Civil Rights Act. Daniel Dean was fired for refusing Sunday work at Ithaca Industries due to his religion. When the Equal Employment Opportunities Commission sued on his behalf, the lower court said that to refuse all Sunday work was so unreasonable that it precluded accommodation by the employer. The appeals court overruled on June 8th, saying that the lower opinion effectively removed Title VII protection from those who keep religious days of rest. The 4th Court also upheld the constitutionality of Title VII.

EEOC v. Sterling Merchandise Co. involved Kenneth Lesniak, a store manager, fired for not working on Sabbath, the chain's busiest day. The firm said the firing was for poor performance; and Lesniak's religious claim was insincere. Noting that company records proved those allegations false, the US District Court for Northern Ohio called Sterling's claims "a classic case of post-hoc rationalization." In plainer words the company lied. On April 24th, 1987, the judges found that Sterling Merchandise could have accommodated Lesniak by offering him an assistant manager's position, which didn't require Saturday work.

Eversly v. MBank, was settled in the US 5th Circuit Court of Appeals on June 8th. It established that a Sabbath keeper cannot require his employer to accommodate him by forcing another employee to permanently change from day shift to night shift involuntarily.

In Forest Hills Early Learning Center v. Grace Baptist Church, a commercial day care-center claimed that Virginia's exemption of church groups from day-care regulations placed secular organizations at a competitive disadvantage. The US 4th Court of Appeals ruled on May 6th that the exemption was consistent with the Constitution's desire to keep religion free from government interference. It recognized day care as a religious mission of the church.

Gen. Conference Corp. of SDA's v. SDA Congregational Church, and John Marik confirmed that the General Conference of SDA's is exclusive owner of Trademark N 1,177,185 for the name Seventh-day Adventist. The US District Court for Hawaii ruled against an independent congregation using that name, even though it claims its beliefs are Adventist as described in the Bible and the writings of Ellen G. White. On May 8th, the court ordered the arrest of pastor John Marik for disregarding the court's finding.

Response to Johnsson Interview

I was happy to acquire two or three copies of TSS while visiting in the United States in August. In the March 1988 issue, Dr. William Johnsson is reported as saying of Seventh-day Adventists: "Very, very early we settle that we would not try to freeze ourselves in time like the Amish."

As a sabbatarian Anabaptist I resent that attitude. The Amish have theological and practical reasons for their practices. They do not try to freeze themselves in time. As a matter of fact, the Amish refusal to use electricity comes from a sensitivity to the observation of the day of rest (for them Sunday). Since the production of electricity requires Sunday labor, they do not use it. There is a good deal of change and diversity going on among Amish people, and there always has been. They are different because they live by their Anabaptist principles rather than by whatever happens to be in fashion.


